

Thanks must go to Al Dunn, Dave Scott and Emma Firth who stepped in to fill a gap in our programme this year after casting issues meant we had to postpone (but not cancel!) our production of The Last Five Years, and revived the hugely well received production of TWO from earlier in the year.

On a personal note, I am looking for someone to take over the running of the wardrobe. As I am approaching my 80th birthday and with some health issues, I am finding it increasingly difficult to cope. Organisational skills are the important attribute as it is increasingly more cost effective to hire than sew and I am always around to help if needed. It could be a small team to spread the load. WITH REGRET

It is with great sadness that we inform you all that the lovely **Angela Healy** passed away on the evening of 6th October.



Angela's sons, Daniel, James and Tim were with her and they said she was comfortable and out of pain.

Most people who have been members of Teignouth Players for any length of time will have performed with her. She was a most talented and natural actress, often sought after by directors and other theatre companies.

I have known her for as long as the eight or so years that I've been a member, but it was only in the last couple of years that we became good friends, and what a friendship. We would often call each other for a spur of the moment day out, sit quietly in her beautiful garden or go to her beach hut putting the world and the Players to rights, often enjoying something stronger than a cup of tea.

The photo I've chosen of her perfectly reflects her fun-loving personality. It was taken at St James' Church during their St James' 200 celebrations in September 2021, which she was mainly responsible for organising.

The thing that she enjoyed most in life was spending time with her three sons and two grandchildren. She would count the days until she could be with them, and spoke fondly and proudly of them.

She was diagnosed with ovarian cancer about 18 months ago, and although devastated by the news, she spoke openly about it and the plans she'd put in place. She chose not to have further treatment, preferring to enjoy her last summer and not endure the side effects of a harsher chemo.

She was so surprised and delighted at how many people went to see her at her beach hut on her birthday in July. I don't think she realised how much affection people had for her.

At the time of writing, I don't know the funeral arrangements I'm afraid, but please let me know if you'd like details.

I know that everyone who ever knew her will be saddened by this news and will join me in sending love and condolences to all her family.

God Bless and Rest in Peace Angela. We shall all miss you.



PRODUCTION REVIEW

ne can always guarantee that Teignmouth Players will present their plays at the Ice Factory in a different style of dramatic presentation, and 84 Charing Cross Road is no exception.


Jeremy Holloway's direction of this more or less two-hander was cleverly set in a bookshop run by Frank Doel, played in confused style by Roger Tarrant as he conducted a pen pal relationship with Helene Hanff, an American small-time writer of Jewish origin portrayed most convincingly by Marnie Devereux telling her story as she swigged her gin and chain smoked.

There were some good cameo performances from Edith Wilmot (Cecily Farr) and Clare Northcott (Megan Wells) and Helene's American actress friend, (Maxine Stuart) as Mr Doel's staff who kept up the busy bookshop atmosphere.

Stuart Lyon (Mr Martin), Alan Haden (Bill Humphries), Piran Wills (Alvin and Thomas) and Margaret Long (Mrs Todd) did some superb miming throughout.

The lighting was, again, very atmospheric and the sound effects throughout created the period well.



In the SPOTLIGH BENJUE TISDALL

When did you first join Teignmouth Players?

About ten years ago Amy-Burton-Smith asked me to play a Lord Flashheart style pirate in the panto **Treasure Island**. I said 'Woof! Yes please' and have never looked back. I my built my part, in that show shamelessly, adding what seemed like several pages of my own dialogue, and sneaking onto stage in scenes I wasn't supposed to be in, dressed as an old woman, to see if Amy noticed, which she didn't.

Where does your love of theatre come from?

I always acted at school. I recall playing Scrooge in **A Christmas Carol**, and Mrs Thatcher hitting James Bond with her handbag.

Are you involved in any shows at the moment?

Yes, I am going to be a brilliant Sherlock Holmes spoof, called '**Baskerville**' at The Little Theatre in Torquay, in October. I'm playing Dr Watson. Four other actors play about 45 other roles. I have a sneaking feeling it might be the best thing I'm ever in. Please come and see it.

What are the top three productions you have been involved in?

I was lucky in my twenties to put on shows at the National Theatre, for Private Eye magazine, which featured people like Harry Enfield, John Sessions, Ian Hislop and Eleanor Bron, so definitely those shows. I'd also choose a production of As You Like It, in Torquay, because the whole team were so fabulous. Director Maggie Campbell even forgave me breaking my shoulder, playing rugby, the week before we went up. I took my sling off each night just before going on stage. Finally, why wouldn't I choose Sleeping Beauty, with Teignmouth Players last year, with such a host of talented people both front and back stage, especially the children. Who knew it was Carabosse all along?

What is your fondest, or funniest memory of your time with Teignmouth Players?

It has to be the final ever show, at the Carlton Theatre before it was knocked down. It was a World War One Drama called **Accrington Pals**. Each night I sat in a cold tin bath completely naked. I had to get out with a towel at the end of the scene. Then two lovely helpers Jodie and Elizabeth, helped me get changed superfast into a soldier's uniform, so I could be in the trenches in the next scene which was about a minute later. Each new show my 'helpers' thought it would be hilarious to make my towel just that little bit smaller, so by the last night it was practically the size of a flannel. I'm told audience numbers of old ladies, went up, as the week went on...

THE CARLTON THEATRE



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Talk me through your ideal night at the theatre?

I would meet a friend for dinner first, preferably someone I could flirt and gossip with, and admire their beauty. I would eat smoked salmon, rib-eye steak, something chocolatey and drink Luscombe St Clements. I would know people in the Ice Factory bar first and there would be hugs and news. The show would make me both laugh and cry, and I would want to be in it. After the show, the entire cast, crew, and audience would decamp to the Pier, all strip off and go swimming.



Do you get the chance to watch other Teignmouth players productions and are there any that stick out in the memory?

Daisy Pulls it Off was the first thing I saw at Teignmouth and it was brilliant. Two was the best thing I have ever seen at the Ice Factory and was conceptually brilliant. Al Dunn is one to watch. I am also a great admirer of both Andy Killen and David Warren as actors – they are both really versatile which is rare – Blackadder has therefore to be mentioned. Are there any rôles that you'd like to revisit? Or any you'd rather forget?!

If you told me I had to be in **Calendar Girls**, again, every summer for the rest of my life, with the same cast, we did it with in Teignmouth, twice, I would cry with joy. I was once in an awful show, in Torquay, called **Gut Girls**. One of the actors jumped twelve pages of the script. I was upstairs in a dressing room and supposed to be on stage about six pages into that. I ran VERY fast...



If you could play any character from any show, whether it's a possibility or not, who would it be any why?

Lord Goring in Oscar Wilde's **An Ideal Husband** is my dream role, in a straight play; or in a musical Fagin in **Oliver!** Both possible. But ideally, I'd like to play the title rôle in **Matilda**, and sing her songs. Sadly that's impossible because I'm not a little girl.

On stage or the big screen, who would be your dream celebrity co-star?

Anyone who knows me, will tell you, ideally, I wouldn't want anyone else on screen with me. However, if I had to select someone, then I'd choose Ben Wishaw, as that would probably mean I was the next James Bond, or Paddington baddie.





VOLUNTEERING



YOUR SOCIETY NEEDS YOU! There are many ways to help support our little theatre group. All are vitally important. Here are a few that we'd love you to think about.

Chaperone training

As most of you will be aware, to put on any show that involves children, there have to be chaperones in place to take care of the little darlings. We literally cannot put a show on without them. To become a chaperone, is quite an easy process. You need to have the usual ID to prove that you are who you say you are, and then take a reasonably simple test with a lovely lady at Babcocks, usually by video link. We pay the costs for that, and your licence is valid for three years. We would then ask that you commit to a couple of performances during the run of the show; usually our pantomimes.

Front of house and bar stewards

This is another area where a show can't take place without a Front of House (FoH) team and someone to run the bar. In a nutshell, we require three people to for the FoH team; one to be stationed in the foyer and check the tickets of the audience as they arrive, one to sell raffle tickets and programmes and one to act as House Steward meeting and greeting people as they enter the auditorium to take their seats. One of the FoH team would we designated as Safety Officer and would sit in the jump seat near the tech desk, and just keep an eye to make sure all is well. As the title suggests, as Bar Steward, you would be running our well stocked, well organised bar. Little training is needed, but for your first time, you would be put with someone who is experienced, just to show you the setting up and closing down procedures.

Morning box office

We open the Box Office in the mornings one week before a show starts, and then during the run of the show. We open from 10am to 12md, using TicketSource ticket provider. The system is very easy to use, and I will do the training. You wouldn't be expected to take a morning shift until you were completely comfortable to be left, and I'm very often only a phone call away.

First aid and fire marshal training

We need to increase the number of people who have First Aid and Fire Marshal training. The First Aid takes approximately six hours, plus a break and the Fire Marshal training is approximately four hours and includes operating fire extinguishers.

Thursday morning working party

There are always little odd jobs (and sometimes not so little) that need doing to keep the Ice Factory running, particularly in the days prior to any of our shows opening. If you're at a loose end on Thursday mornings, then please come and join us. You will be amply rewarded with a nice cuppa, biscuits, and sometimes cake. I'm usually in the Box Office every Thursday from around 10.30, so you can also pop in for a chat and a cuppa.



A REMINDER ABOUT EXPENSES CLAIMS

Money makes the world go around

Don't forget the updated internal procedures to make sure we can trace, analyse and audit our finances better as well as help us get your money to you more quickly. If you have expenses to claim or need to purchase goods or services on behalf of the society

please check with the appropriate budget holder before making purchases on behalf of the Society.

If you need to travel on Society business, any claim for this must be agreed in advance of the trip.

Essentially, expenditure falls into four areas.

1. Production expenditure:

For this you will be able to spend as long as the production budget has been signed of by the committee.

2. Project based expenditure:

This will need a project budget, which will also need to be signed off by the committee and/or Trustees.

 Expenses: You must check with a member of the committee or the treasurer prior to spending. These expenses should be claimed retrospectively using an expenses claim form.

If purchasing in advance of any spend causes difficulties, please talk to the treasurer, who may in certain circumstances be able to release the funds.

4. Petty cash: These are for minor purchases such as the coffee, tea, milk etc. for the kitchen, cleaning products etc. As long as you have a receipt, you can ask a member of the committee to refund these to you directly from the petty cash box.

For ALL claims, please note a proper receipt MUST be provided.
